



NC Injury Law Reviews Regional Truck Crash Legal Risks

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WILMINGTON, NC - September 14, 2026 -

A tractor-trailer crash on July 29, 2026 shut down both southbound lanes of US Highway 17 near College Road in Brunswick County, with the Brunswick County Sheriff's Office confirming that emergency crews responded and rerouted southbound traffic to Randolphville Road. The corridor connects Wilmington's southern suburbs to a Brunswick County distribution and logistics network that has grown alongside the county's residential and commercial expansion. NC Injury Law, PLLC is addressing the legal challenges that truck accident victims can face on the greater Wilmington region's secondary freight corridors.

The firm noted a second serious incident weeks later. On August 18, 2026, a tractor-trailer traveling I-40 eastbound went through median cable barriers after a tire failure, crossing into oncoming westbound traffic before leaving the roadway. WECT reported that the crash closed lanes. Tire blowout events can create catastrophic risk when commercial vehicles traveling at highway speeds lose directional control and cross into opposing lanes.

The pattern continued into September 2026, when a crash on US-421 southbound in New Hanover County closed all southbound lanes past Sutton Lake Road, according to DriveNC traffic data. That corridor links Wilmington's northern communities to the city's industrial and port access districts, and the closure generated significant traffic backup.

According to the firm, these incidents illustrate a challenge under North Carolina law. The state requires truck accident victims to prove the other party's negligence without contributing to the crash themselves, and its contributory negligence rule generally bars recovery for a victim found even one percent at fault. In cases where a tractor-trailer crossed into oncoming lanes after a tire failure, insurance defense teams for a carrier may investigate whether the victim was following too closely, speeding, or failed to take evasive action, because such a finding can affect the entire claim.

Thomas York, Founding Attorney at NC Injury Law, discussed the legal dynamics at play. "When a tractor-trailer crosses a median cable barrier or enters opposing traffic after a tire blowout, a carrier's defense team often argues the driver had no control and shifts scrutiny to the victim's following distance or speed, which under North Carolina's contributory negligence rule can jeopardize the entire claim," York said. "ELD records from the hours before a crash can, in some cases, reveal hours-of-service violations, and reviewing that evidence early is important. After 34 years in Wilmington-area practice, a Wilmington truck accident lawyer is often familiar with the carriers that operate these corridors and the insurers that handle their claims."

Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration regulations require commercial truck drivers to maintain electronic logging device records documenting hours of service, with a maximum of 11 hours of driving time following 10 consecutive hours off duty. When an ELD record indicates that a driver exceeded these limits before a crash, the firm noted that the violation may support negligence per se arguments in a victim's civil claim, subject to the facts and evidence of each case.

The firm stated that in truck crash matters it works to issue FMCSA evidence preservation demands, subpoena ELD records, and request driver qualification files early in a case.
